During a Kremlin news conference, Premier Khrushchev launches a personal attack on President Eisenhower saying "the best job he could do is Head of a children's home where he could do no harm, but as the Head of State he is dangerous and can do great harm".

New York City: The National Council of Churches condemn the amount of sex and violence now on TV and Radio.

Broadway theaters are shut down for the first time since September 7th, 1919, as a result of a contract dispute between the 112,000-member AFL-CIO Actors Equity Association and the League of N.Y. Theaters.

The sister of Adolf Hitler, Paula Wolf, 64, dies in Germany. She adopted the name Wolf in the early 1920's.

Russian poet and novelist Boris Leonidovich Pasternak, 70, Nobel Prize-winning author of "Doctor Zhivago", is buried in Moscow (died May 30th).

Legendary jockey Johnny Longden, 53, announces his retirement from horse racing.

The National Education Association annual report indicates that average annual salaries of classroom teachers for the following States are:

Senate majority leader Lyndon Baines Johnson, 51, (Texas), becomes the 5th announced candidate for the Democratic Presidential Nomination. Two previously announced candidates, Senators Humphrey and Morse, have already quit the race.

According to a recent joint-commissioned report, one out of four Americans has sought professional help to deal with emotional disturbances. 42% of those seeking help were for marital problems. Most people seeking help choose clergymen for professional help (45%).

The American Heart Association reports that a number of medical studies have shown a "statistical" association between cigarette smoking and death or illness from coronary heart disease.

The average annual wage per working person in the U.S. for this year is \$2,606.

In a ceremonial demonstration, legendary singer Bing Crosby is presented with a symbolic platinum disc in recognition of his 200 millionth record sale from his 125 albums and 2,600 singles.

Boston, Massachusetts: World Middleweight Boxing Champion, Paul Pender retains his title in a 15-round decision following a rematch with 5-time former champion, Sugar Ray Robinson. This is his first defense of the title.

"Celtic Ash" with jockey William Hartack aboard wins the Belmont Stakes Horse Race for 3-year-olds, racing down the 1 1/2-mile track in 2:29 3/5. Second place goes to "Venetian Way" with "Disperse" placing third in this historic race first run in 1867.

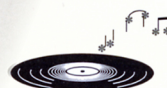

Americans celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Father's Day observance. The idea originated with Mrs. John Bruce Dodd of the YWCA of Spokane, Washington. On May 25th Robert Kennedy, 34, father of 7, is named this year's "Father of the Year".

Polo Grounds, New York: 31,892 fans watch as Floyd Patterson becomes the first man in boxing history to regain the Heavyweight Championship of the World as he knocks out Ingemar Johansson of Sweden at 1:51 of the 5th round with a left hook. Patterson lost the title to Johansson on June 26, 1959.

Armin Hary, a high profile German sprinter, makes world record track history, racing the 100 meters in 10.0 seconds flat at a meet in Zurich. Hary will go on to win a Gold Medal in September at the Rome Olympics.

The N.Y. State Athletic Commission sponsors a medical conference to study injuries & deaths in professional boxing. It concludes that a ring knockout does not produce lasting changes in the brain. The term "punch-drunk" was a point of controversy as one group felt it was the result of repeated knockouts, and the other believed the knockouts have nothing to do with the condition.

The United States Secret Service celebrates its 100th anniversary.

At the L.A. Invitational Swim Meet, 3 world records are broken: 200-m backstroke 2:27.6 sec by Charles Bittick of L.A. Women's 100-m backstroke in 1:11.2 by Lynne Burke of N.Y. 100-m butterfly in 59 seconds by Lance Larson of L.A.

Census Bureau figures show that from 1950 to the 1960 census, Florida was the fastest-growing state followed by Nevada, Alaska and California. The most populated state is N.Y. with 16.59 million, followed by California with 15.53 million. The U.S. population total is now estimated at 179,500,000.

President Eisenhower vetoes a bill that would raise 1,500,000 federal employees' pay by 7 1/2%. Eisenhower rejects the bill, charging "pressure tactics" by postal employees. The 169th veto by Eisenhower during his office will be overridden tomorrow by a house vote of 345 to 69.
